Rehearsals are well under way for the Nativity Panto, "Babe in a Manger", and there is a real sense of excitement in the cast as it comes together. Maybe you too remember the excitement of going to a panto when you were younger, or preparing for Christmas, not quite knowing what presents you might be receiving. Advent is that time when we are preparing for Christmas, and I wonder if you still have a glimpse of that excitement. It is that excitement which is infectious about our faith, and it forms the basis of our evangelism. We feel excited and so others catch hold of that emotion and can't help but pass it on.

But Advent is also preparation, preparation for change. In preparing for the birth of the Christ-child, we are preparing for the biggest change in world history, Immanuel, God with us. Change can be challenging and disruptive, but only God stays the same. As our society is changing so our church needs to change, to adapt to its new situation. There is a word which is being used more often these days, 'sustainability', usually used in terms of the environment, but often to sustaining businesses. It is asking the question; can things carry on going into the future the way things are today? We can ask the same question of our church and our circuit, and my sense is that our churches cannot keep going the way we have always been doing things. Some things need to change.

I'm just wondering when we think about hubs and churches, what is the next thing which needs to change. Maybe we can reflect on this during this period of Advent and welcome the changes in, as we welcome the birth of Jesus into our world, a world-changing event.

It was lovely to be able to share the magazine article with many of you, about the CAP work I am doing (with your help and support) and the reality of rural poverty, in our benefice. Unfortunately, those who receive the 'Waymaker' newsletter didn't receive the pictures that went with the article. I would love to share the full article with you. If you would like to be emailed this, please contact me (see below) and I will gladly send this to you.

I will soon be visiting all of the churches in the Rame and Rivers Benefice checking the posters, leaflets and postcards. As you can appreciate this takes some time (and miles) and not all churches will be open when I visit. I would very much appreciate any messages of leaflets needing topping up as this arises. If you know anyone that could benefit from some help with their debts please give them one of the leaflets from the churches or give them the freephone number for head office (to discuss/make an appointment). This is **0800 328 0006**.

Recently, my Debt Coach colleagues met with Rev. Mark Wade, the new vicar at St Martin's, Liskeard (where the debt centre is run from) and we were asked to share a low and high point from the work we do. My high point was to be able to share about Alfie with you, who continues to be debt-free and going deeper in his faith, and also the reaction that some of my clients have to being offered and receiving prayer for the first time. The low point has had to be accepting that I can't help all clients out of debt. Sometimes, it is just not the right time for them to take on this (often challenging) process. I have to offer it up to God. My manager has often reminded me that we don't know the end of the story, but God does. One of the main reasons that Mark applied for the position was due to the fact that he and his family secretly visited the church during our CAP Sunday back in February and he loved what we shared about what we do! He has a heart for social ministry.

I enjoyed sharing with Cornerstone Church, Torpoint in August about the work that I do here. They were very supportive and welcoming and my very first school teacher was there, which was lovely.

I shared with those at the benefice safeguarding service on Sunday 27th October, a few days before a couple from St Martin's Church, Liskeard had offered their 'old, reliable' car to any of our clients that could benefit, for free. I got straight on to a family in our area that I knew would benefit from this and have liaised between all parties. They are so grateful for this kind gesture and will be collecting it next week. This will help with the school run and the family being able to access cheaper groceries. I just LOVE this – the relationships and networks that are being built to help the more vulnerable in our local community. As I shared, this is Jesus in action going where He is needed in our special part of Cornwall.

Finally, I wish you all a wonderful Advent, Christmas and New Year.

Christians Against Poverty Update – Winter 2024

Dear Church Family,

I want to share this last update for 2024 as we hurtle towards Christmas, with plans for a CAP Christmas party and hampers for clients going on in the background. In September, one year after visiting my first client, I passed the final assessment of my training to be a CAP Debt Coach (we will constantly have reviews and updates, but the initial training is now complete). My final assessment was a recorded 'budget/route out of debt advice visit' and it felt great to be 'properly passed out' after months of on-the-job training.

To date, I have had 19 different cases, with new clients to visit in Millbrook and Cawsand over the next few weeks. With those 19 cases there have been a total of 35 people living in those households – 35 people who may have experienced something of Jesus' compassion through the Church for the first time.

One of my clients has attended a new fortnightly group that has started at St Martin's Church, Liskeard. It's a group for women 'offering support, kindness, friendship, faith and wellbeing', based on Proverbs 31:25 – 'Strength and dignity are her clothing, and she laughs at the time to come'. I am hoping that more of my clients will be able to join this group – geography and rural transport are an issue, but I will try to help with that when appointments allow. This group (SOAR for Women) came out of the success (and spread across Cornwall!) of the SOAR for Men group which is being led by a former CAP client. Many who attend this group have started to attend church regularly in Liskeard. My prayer is that one day we may have the resources for this in our benefice. I helped organise a Cost-of-Living event at Torpoint Library and Community Hub where people could access advice and support from several organisations including CAP, National Energy Action, the Foodbank, Devonport Jobcentre, Age UK and Volunteer Cornwall. As well as being so valuable to those who came along looking for advice, it was great to 'network' with these organisations as it all helps to work in collaboration with each other to provide the holistic, wrap-around support in this community that some of my clients need.

Together, with the local Social Prescriber and the Manager at Torpoint Library and Community Hub, we are forming a Torpoint Partnership Plan. With other organisations such as Torpoint Town Council, CHAT (Community Health Around Torpoint) and Kernow Health CIC, we will have our first meeting in November. We are aiming to bring together all the local/relevant organisations that would all benefit from knowing what each other does so we can signpost our clients more effectively. My clients rarely need ONLY debt advice – there are often so many different aspects to my clients' lives that need support.

I continue to be very grateful to my CAP prayer team, befrienders and Mum (for baking goods/picking flowers to take to clients). If anyone wants to be part of the team (perhaps you have something to offer) then please do contact me. This is a whole church ministry and you are all welcome to be part of it. No huge commitment needs to be made.
